Glass Walls


The glass wall defines the space as contemporary, and makes a huge design statement and impact as you walk through the door.

Exposures

Since it is attached on both sides, there are only two exposures to work with, north and south.

Natural Light

Natural light is a huge focus in the room, thanks to the laminated glass front doors, which make the room feel more spacious. Enlarged front windows and French doors in the back give a sense of visual continuity throughout the space.





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
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We've all got that "to-do list of doom" during the spring season. We hate the idea of losing an entire week (or more) to scrubbing, wiping and disinfecting. Learn how to accomplish the tough jobs with time to spare and eliminate the need for an aspirin afterwards.

Washers, Dryers and Dishwashers

- 1-2 cups bleach
- 2-3 cups vinegar
- Wire lint remover (made for dryers)
- Sponge and several clean cloths/rags

It may seem counterproductive, but your cleaners need cleaning, too. If the machines are dirty, everything you think they're cleaning will be dirty as well. The washer and dryer can be cleaned simultaneously and with little effort. Start by letting your washer fill at the hottest setting. When full, leave open and ONLY pour in the bleach. DO NOT pour in the vinegar.

Close your washer and let it agitate for a few moments. Open it back up and let it sit for 30 minutes to an hour. While your washer is soaking in the bleach bath, take time to clean out all of the lint from your dryer. Remove the grate and run the wire lint remover through the back and around the insides. Once you've removed all the lint possible, put everything back together. Your washer is ready to cycle through now. Close the lid and let it run as normal, until the bleach mixture is gone. Take a clean cloth and wipe out the inside of the washer, DO NOT wipe the outside.

Next comes the vinegar bath. Repeat the same process for your washer, adding 2 cups vinegar when the water fills up. Let agitate and sit for another 30 minutes. At this time, take your sponge and dip it into the vinegar mixture in your washer. Wipe down the tops and outside of your washer and dryer with this mixture. Run a clean, dry cloth over them to finish. Let your washer run through another cycle or two to rinse the mixtures out completely before doing a load.



For your dishwasher, let it run through a cycle or begin this process after you've just used it. Take the remaining cup of vinegar and pour into the bottom where the filter and arms are. Close the machine and start a cycle, letting it run halfway through. Stop the machine and crack it open to let the vinegar mixture settle for a few minutes. Close the machine back up and let the cycle finish. Wipe inside with a clean cloth, be sure to pick out any food particles left behind in the grates and arms. Your machines will sparkle and be ready to report for cleaning duties all summer long!





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SPRING CLEANING

Ovens

- 1-2 cups Ammonia
- Several tsp Baking Soda
- 1-2 cups Boiling Water

Preheat oven to 200° then turn it off. Pour ammonia and boiling water into two separate heat-safe dishes. Put ammonia dish on the middle rack and boiling water dish on the bottom rack. Close oven and let it sit overnight. Moisten a sponge with warm water and sprinkle baking soda on it. Wipe the oven clean. Be sure to rinse and add more baking soda to the sponge throughout the process, so as not to spread the grease back onto the clean surface.

Everything will melt off, even the crud-covered racks. For burners, add a 1/3 cup of ammonia to a freezer bag and place one burner inside. Seal and let sit overnight. Repeat the wiping process with the sponge and a bit more baking soda. Rinse and voila!

Grout, Sinks, and Tubs

- Baking soda
- Vinegar
- Scrub brush with bristles and sponge

For these pesky areas, plain old chemistry is all it takes to remove dirt and grimy build-up. First, sprinkle baking soda along grout grooves, all over sinks and inside of tubs. If your shower is tiled, try coating the area with a splash of warm water before sprinkling on the baking soda, so it sticks. After everything is covered, spritz vinegar generously on top. You'll notice a reaction, which will cause the baking soda to fizz and bubble up. This is completely safe, even the kids can help scrub, which is the next step.

Take your scrubby, or an old toothbrush for the smaller areas, and begin to scrub after the bubbling mixture has been allowed to set in for at least five minutes but no longer than ten. Try not to wipe down muddy areas as you're scrubbing. You'll want the surface to be gritty, letting the mixture work as long as possible. Once you've scrubbed out all the grime, you can now rinse thoroughly and wipe clean with a sponge or moistened rags.



Ceiling Fans, Light Fixtures and Electronics

- Old towels and/or pillowcases
- All-Purpose Cleaner Spray
- Rags/Microfiber Towels or Paper Towels
- Coffee Filters

Cleaning ceiling fans is always something we dread doing because the dust ends up falling on us. To avoid becoming a dust bunny yourself, simply slide a pillowcase over the blade or wrap the blade in a towel. Apply pressure to grab the clumps of dirt and pull off. The dust is now all inside of the pillowcase (or towel). Turn them inside out, give them a shake in the yard and throw them into the washing machine.

Go over the blades once more with your choice of cleaner and some paper towels to finish the job. Secure a cloth or microfiber towel to your broom with a rubber band and use the handle to reach inconvenient areas that have collected dust throughout the year, such as around the bases of fixtures and ceiling corners

Take a rag and run it over all of your electronics to collect the dust once more. Repeat the ceiling fan process by lightly spraying a paper towel with cleaner and going over the surfaces for a complete clean. Finish off by taking a coffee filter and wiping the electronics down to grab any leftover lint and cleaner. For TV screens, only use a coffee filter or microfiber towel, DO NOT spray cleaner on the screen. If you have spots or smudges, it is best to purchase a cleaner designed to be safe for electronics. Use this to freshen up computer monitors, tablets, and other devices with screens as well.

Blinds, Curtains, and Upholstery

- Steam Cleaner
- Fabric Freshener Spray
- Warm Water and Mild Soap

When cleaning curtains and upholstery, there's nothing better than a steam cleaner. You can rent one but it will be worth every penny if you buy your own. Instead of having to take down your curtains, wash them, iron them out, and hope that this entire process doesn't fade your colors and patterns, a simple steam clean will do the trick in half the time. They work great for carpets, throw pillows and sofas, granite countertops, tile, and much more. For your living room furniture – recliners, sofas and rugs – simply run the steam cleaner as directed and finish off with a fabric freshener. Be sure to spray the freshener on the fabric from a distance, to avoid accidental staining..

For blinds (vertical or mini), take the whole thing down and throw it in the bathtub with some warm water and mild soap of your choice. Allow them to soak for half an hour or so, then wash them with a sponge as if you're doing dishes. The dirt will come off immediately and the process is much easier than standing up and cleaning each blind individually. Allow

them to dry by patting them down, hanging them back up, and opening your windows for the day. The breeze will dry the blinds and invite fresh air into the home, freeing you from all your cleaning fumes, and lessening the chance of your getting a literal headache.





Invest in cleaning tools that will make your chores a lot easier to accomplish, such as extension handles for dusters, microfiber towels, buckets and rubber gloves to keep your hands out of harsh chemicals. Once the cleaning is done, light a few candles and enjoy the freshness. Getting through summer will be a breeze once you've tackled the big messes. Some general tips while you're at it: start from top to bottom, never mix chemicals – even if the internet says it's okay – and play some music and enjoy take-out while going through the motions.

Starting from top to bottom will eliminate the need to clean areas twice, as dust will naturally fall down and collect on the lower levels. Mixing chemicals, like vinegar and bleach, will cause a reaction that produces chlorine gas, which is poisonous and can irritate the eyes, nose and throat. Never mix ammonia with anything; it's powerful all by itself. Getting take-out and turning up the tunes will allow you to enjoy your time more and eliminate the need to cook after a long, hard day of chores. Spring cleaning has never been so easy or so stress-free!



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WORKS



Now more than ever, we need environments doused in color that has the power to delight, inspire, and refresh. Who doesn't need a dose of happy right about now? That's what 2015 holds for us in the world of home décor color. The forecast for home decor includes colors dripping with optimism and hope, candy colors and jewel tones paired with just enough sparkle and warm metallics to keep them grounded, yet energized.

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
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We'll see happier, cleaner colors paired with white, black, and gray. A bit nostalgic of 1960s Palm Springs and 1980s Preppy, the colors of 2015 include your favorites of yesteryear paired in new and exciting combinations that will look fresh and invigorating.

Greens will be as popular as ever, with trending ones including mint, jade, and emerald. There are indications that the olive greens currently hot in fashion will begin to emerge in décor, but it remains to be seen if enough time has passed since the last olive trend for consumers to really buy into that one. If you see it, it will definitely show up in unexpected combinations with fresher colors like peach, blush pink, and mint green.

While pink and peach beiges fade into our memories, blush pink and true peach will appear in purer renditions. I believe we will see coral hues beginning to replace oranges and reds as accent colors in interiors. Peach and cantaloupe will add the flavor needed to punch up the blues and greens and to enliven grays and blacks in your interior color palette.

If gray is the new beige, indigo blue is the new black. Indigo and navy will be the perfect "neutral" that will ground the fresh, new color palette. Predictable beige and gray are no longer the only way to go when choosing an upholstery fabric for your sofa. Instead, a sofa in your favorite color is a better choice for the largest piece of upholstered seating in your living or family room. Is your favorite color blue? Then choose a turquoise, royal, or navy sofa. Love yellow? A sunny yellow sofa will never get old - just make sure to choose a solid color and you will be able to change out pillows and blankets in different colors and patterns to change the look in a couple of years.





While you keep your sofa solid, put some pattern on your chairs to keep things interesting. Color pairings like coral and aqua, raspberry and navy, and mint and emerald will look fresh for 2015.

For upholstered chairs, window treatments, and throw pillows, look for traditional patterns in contemporary colorways. Florals, Asian motifs, and deconstructed geometric patterns will be seen in fabrics and rugs in 2015.

To warm up the cleaner, fresher colors, trending metals in 2015 include bold golds, champagne or winter gold, polished nickel, and copper. Wood will continue to be weathered, grayed, and bleached. As for brown paint colors? Not so much. Warm up your space with the real deal - distressed and weathered wood is being applied to walls and ceilings in interesting ways. Classic marble and light-colored quartz are the top choices for

stone this year, particularly in countertop options. Painted kitchen cabinets continue to be the top choice in new home builds, especially in whites and light gray tones.

In spite of the fact that color marketing giant, Pantone, named the burgundy-hued "Marsala" as 2015 Color of the Year, I don't believe consumers are ready to reintroduce the mauves and wines that dominated home décor in the 1980s and 1990s. Many of my clients are just now banishing those from their homes! While the 2014 Color of the Year was Radiant Orchid, I have yet to see that color on the shelves in home décor stores. Pantone's Color of the Year tends to have more of an impact on print marketing, fashion, and fingernail polish than it does on residential paint colors and home décor trends, so you shouldn't put a lot of stock in it for choosing a color for your wall or sofa.

If you are ready for a little happiness in your home décor, 2015 just might be the year for you. Adding color to your life and your rooms can lift your spirits and inspire new ideas for the new year. And don't forget to pick a new sofa in your favorite color!

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

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CHILES RELLENOS WITH VEGETABLE PICADILLO

Aarón Sánchez for Simple Food, Big Flavor





INGREDIENTS

4 large poblano chiles
1 tablespoon canola oil
1/4 cup finely chopped white onion
1/4 cup finely chopped red bell pepper
1/4 cup corn kernels, fresh or frozen
2 tablespoons chopped fresh cilantro
1/2 cup diced queso blanco or Jack cheese
1 tablespoon Cilantro-Cotija Pesto

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Turn two of your stove's burners to medium-high. Place 2 poblano chiles on each burner and roast them, turning them occasionally with tongs, until they're charred all over and soft but not mushy, about 7 minutes. Transfer them to a big bowl or soup pot, cover it tightly with plastic wrap, and let the chiles steam for 10 minutes. Peel them, being careful to keep them intact. Rub off the skins; don't rinse under water.
- 2. Preheat the oven to 350°F. Heat the oil in a skillet over medium heat. Add the onion, bell pepper, and corn and cook until the onion has softened and the pepper is just cooked through, about 5 minutes. Stir in the cilantro and transfer the mixture to a large bowl to cool slightly. Add the cheese and Cotija-Cotija Pesto and mix well.
- 3. Cut a lengthwise slit in each pepper, pull out and discard the seeds and veins, but keep the stem on. Divide the filling among the chiles. Lay them in a 1-quart baking dish and bake for 10 to 12 minutes, until the cheese is melting. Serve at once.
- Note: If you don't have a gas stove, put your peppers on a baking sheet and cook them under the broiler until they char, turning several times, about 10 minutes all together.

CILANTRO-COTIJA PESTO

Aarón Sánchez for Simple Food, Big Flavor

Makes 2 Cups

INGREDIENTS

1 cup unsalted raw or roasted pumpkin seeds ½ bunch fresh cilantro, stems trimmed 2 inches from the bottom

1 cup fresh basil leaves

1 cup olive oil, plus extra for storage

½ serrano chile or 1 jalapeno, coarsely chopped (include seeds for additional spice)

2 garlic cloves, coarsely chopped

½ crumbled cotija (preferably Cacique brand) or shredded pecorino or Parmesan Salt and freshly ground black pepper

DIRECTIONS

- 4. Preheat the oven to 400°F
- 5. Spread the pumpkin seeds in an even layer on a dry baking sheet. Put the sheet in the oven and bake, checking them and shaking the pan every 3 minutes, until they start to dance, puff up and brown lightly, about 10 minutes. Take the pan out of the oven, transfer the seeds to a bowl and let cool to room temperature.
- 6. Put the cilantro, basil and olive oil into a food processor, and puree for 2 minutes. Add the chile, garlic, pumpkin seeds and cotija and pulse until you have a coarse puree. Season with salt and pepper to taste.
- 7. To store, put it into a container with a tight-fitting lid and pour ¼ inch of olive oil over the surface to keep out the air. Each time you use it, stir that oil in, and replace with another ¼ inch of oil before closing the container, this makes an airtight seal that will keep it tasting fresh for up to 10 days.



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BIRRIA

(MEXICAN STEW)





2 tablespoons olive oil

1 pound beef top round, cubed for stew

1 pound baby back pork ribs, cut into 1-inch pieces by your butcher

2 ½ quarts beef or chicken stock (low-sodium store-bought is fine)

1 medium white or yellow onion, coarsely chopped

6 whole garlic cloves, peeled

1 cup Chile Colorado Sauce

2 fresh or dried bay leaves

Finely chopped leaves of 6 sprigs fresh thyme

1 tablespoon dried whole oregano (preferably Mexican)

Salt and freshly ground black pepper

2 limes, cut into wedges, for serving

DIRECTIONS

- Heat a large, deep heavy pot or Dutch oven over medium heat. Pour in the olive oil, and working in batches to avoid crowding your pan, brown the beef and ribs on all sides, transferring the meat to a plate as it's browned.
- Pour in the stock and stir in the onion and garlic, scraping the browned bits from the pan with a wooden spoon. Return all the meat to the pot, bring to a boil, then reduce the heat and cook at a gentle simmer for 1 hour, until the meats are almost tender.
- Stir in the Chile Colorado Sauce, bay leaves, thyme, oregano, and salt and pepper to taste. Simmer until the meat is tender, about 30 minutes or more. Add more salt if necessary.
- Serve the stew in big bowls with lime wedges on the side for squeezing.



CHILE COLORADO SAUCE Makes 2 Quarts

INGREDIENTS

3 medium Spanish or white onions, quartered

8 medium fresh tomatillos, husked and washed

4 plum tomatoes, cored and quartered

8 whole garlic cloves, peeled

Olive oil, for drizzling

1 ancho chile (1/2 ounce), stemmed, seeded, and deveined

2 guajillo chiles (1/2 ounce), stemmed, seeded, and deveined

1 quart chicken stock (low-sodium store-bought is fine)

Salt and freshly ground black pepper

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Preheat the broiler.
- Put the onion, tomatillos, tomatoes and garlic on a baking pan and drizzle them with olive oil. Put the baking sheet under the broiler and cook without turning until the vegetables start to get charred, about 7 minutes. Remove, set aside, and let cool to room temperature.
- 3. In a large dry skillet over medium-low heat, toast the guajillos, turning them over halfway through, just until they smell great, about 1 minute. Transfer them to a bowl, cover them with hot water and let them soak until they're soft, about 30 minutes. Drain the chiles and discard the soaking water.
- 4. Combine the vegetables and chiles in a blender with the chicken stock (you'll have to work in batches) and puree until the mixture is very smooth. Transfer each batch to a bowl as it's done, and stir the batches together well. Season with salt and pepper to taste.
- 5. Store it in an airtight container in the refrigerator for up to a week or in the freezer for up to a month.

PALOMA MARGARITA



Flavor profile: rich flavors, soft acidity, solid kick, gently sweet (color - dark pink/ light red, from Hibiscus)

Glass:

coupe, rim with lime, tajin or sea salt rim, lime wheel garnish

INGREDIENTS

1oz Fresh Lime Juice ½ oz House Orange tincture (or triple sec) ½ oz grand marnier

½ oz hibiscus nectar (or a splash of cassis)

DIRECTIONS

2oz chinaco silver tequila

Shake, double strain.

TAMALES

DE MOLE AMARILLO





INGREDIENTS

10 dried corn husks
11/2 cup masa harina
11/4 cup chicken stock
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup shredded cooked chicken
Amarillo Mole

DIRECTIONS

- In a large mixing bowl soak the corn husks for 30 minutes.
- In another bowl, add the masa harina and salt and with a whisk, mix well. Slowly add the chicken stock to the masa harina and mix well until a dough-like consistency. Make 10 ping-pong ball size balls of dough.
- 3. In a plastic-lined tortilla press (both sides), press out each ball of dough to form a 5-inch round. Carefully remove the tortilla, and place a spoonful of amarillo mole sauce, a spoonful of shredded cooked chicken. Fold each side of the tortilla and place in a corn husk length-wise. Secure both ends with a string or part of the husk used as a string, and repeat process.
- 4. Steam for 30 minutes.

MOLE AMARILLO

INGREDIENTS

3 guajillo chiles, seeded and deveined

1 ancho chile, seeded and deveined

1 medium onion

4 garlic cloves

5 medium tomatillos

2 medium green tomatoes

15 black peppercorns

7 whole cloves

3 large Hoja Santa leaves or 5 dried Hoja Santa leaves

3 tablespoons lard or vegetable oil

3 tablespoons masa harina

3 tablespoons water

DIRECTIONS

- Toast chiles on a griddle. Remove and place in a bowl. Cover with boiling water and let stand for 20 minutes.
- 2. In a hot cast iron pan, roast the onion, garlic, tomatillos, and green tomatoes. Roast until well charred on all sides. Place in a bowl and let cool.
- Meanwhile grind peppercorns and cloves in coffee grinder. When the vegetables are cool enough to handle peel off the charred skin and puree them in a blender with the hoja santa leaves, drained chiles, and spices.
- 4. In hot pot, heat the lard, add the pureed strained sauce, and cook for 5 minutes.
- In a small bowl, add the masa harina and water. Mix until well blended. Add this mixture to the sauce and cook for 5 minutes more, until done.

De-Clutter; One Room at a Time

Every room has a purpose. Yet, more often than not, we find ourselves doing paperwork in the kitchen and eating dinner in the living room. This year, spend some time de-cluttering so each area goes back to being functional for its specific duty, and you go back to enjoying that room for what it's intended to be.



Vanities & Linen Closets

Linen closets and bathroom vanities can fill up over time and before we know it, we're rummaging through piles of junk to get to what we need. By installing a few convertible shelves and throwing away items no longer needed, you'll save space and restore functionality in minutes.

First, take everything out of the closet. Spread all the items out so that you can easily group them together by size and purpose, and of course you'll be making a "throw away" pile for expired medications and make-up, as well as things you simply don't use anymore. Once you've sorted through your items, take a few minutes to wipe down the shelves and remove any dust off of the items themselves.

Install cabinet shelving or a removable cubby system into the closet for small items, such as perfume bottles, hand towels, and nail polish. These shelves will help you keep everything front and center, easy to reach and no longer hidden from view. For the bigger items, such as towels and packages of bathroom tissue, make sure they're neatly stacked on the bottom shelves. The rule of thumb here: start from top to bottom, organizing from smallest to largest.

Now on to the vanity. For most of us, this is simply the bathroom counter, where all of our daily-use items live. To organize this space, buy a make-up carousel for storing tiny items like eye-shadow and tweezers. Keep hair bows, brushes, and moisturizers in small shelf bins. Line everything up neatly along the back of your counter. Wipe it clean and add a few candles or a bowl of potpourri and presto! Your vanity looks as good as a model home's.



If there is one thing we hate about cleaning our bedrooms, it's going through our closets and dressers. There's just so much stuff! Shoes we never wear (but might!), and boxes of who-knows-what's in them. It's time to reorganize and refresh your belongings.



First, start by going shopping. Not at a store, but in your own closet. Take a bag and thumb through your hangers and shelves. If you spot garments and accessories that you don't see yourself wearing, or they don't fit anymore, toss them into your bag. Granted, this "shopping bag" won't be yours when you're done with it; it goes to charity, or you can sell your items online or to Plato's Closet for some extra cash.

Next, you'll want to take out those mystery junk boxes. We all have them. Some of us think we know what's in there, most of us will admit we have no idea. Nevertheless, open them and sort. Throw items out if they're useless. Keepsakes and holiday decorations do not belong in your personal closet, so set these types of boxes aside to be put in the attic or garage (we'll get to that later).

Finally, focus on the accessories and the dresser. Place belts and handbags on a hanger or install hooks for a more functional, organized look. Use plastic bins to store gloves, undies, and other small accessories. As for the dresser, focus on one drawer at a time. Get rid of anything you don't wear or need, such as old pajamas and socks with holes in them. Reorganize by hanging up any items that are wrinkled and be sure to sanitize the drawers before filling them back up; your dresser will thank you for it.

The kitchen is the heart of the home, thus making it a high-traffic area. There's usually always some type of clutter in the kitchen because it is constantly being used. Here are some tips for organizing the hub of the house.

Start with the pantry. Have you ever gone to the store and purchased an ingredient that you already had at home but didn't notice because it was buried deep in your pantry? Eliminate that from happening again in five minutes. First, remove everything and wipe off the shelves. Install a spice rack (they're unbelievably functional) and create more space by adding storage bins on the floor of your pantry as well.

If you have an overload of canned/packaged goods that you haven't used and probably won't in the near future, put them in a bag and donate them. The same rule of thumb as before also applies here: top to bottom, smallest to largest. Canned goods should be stored somewhere in between (you don't want a can from the top shelf falling on your toe!). Extra paper goods, like napkins, and lightweight items should be placed on the higher shelves. Make use of that Tupperware you have but can't find the lid to by placing loose items like gravy and oatmeal packets in them.

Most refrigerators follow that rule of thumb as well: the higher shelves are smaller, the ones on the bottom are larger, reserved for milk jugs and such. Keep it this way for maximum safety and space. A helpful tip while sorting: organize by "use by" date. Things that are going to last a while can be stored in the back, while you should have your soon-to-expire items up front so you'll use them first. Take out anything on the door of your refrigerator that you haven't used in the last 6 months and throw it away, it's only taking up space!

Your kitchen counters probably serve the biggest purpose in the space. They provide you with a workspace, a place to set your groceries, an area to set up serving trays, and more. So why take away space from yourself by cluttering your countertops with things you don't use every day. Take all small appliances that you haven't used in the last week off of your counters and store them in a cabinet or give them away if you don't ever put them to use. Mix 2 cups of hot water with a tablespoon of concentrated bleach, and disinfect the countertops. making sure to reach all corners. Once bleached, go back over the counters with just hot water. Put a shallow, decorative bowl at the end of your countertop as a designated spot for mail, keys, cards, and anything else that normally ends up sprawled across the counter.





Every entertainment center could use some reorganizing, and if you have children, you know their area of the living room is always a little awry. Invest in storage ottomans. They appear to be extra seating tucked away in a corner, but open the tops and you've got a large box for use as a toy chest. Place all of your children's toys inside and put the top back on. Your guests will never know they're sitting on Legos.

Entertainment Center & Kids' Play Area

You can designate a storage-seat to each child, so only his or her toys will be stored in there, and it will be their job to keep it organized. A good way to section off the play area is with a rug. Lay one down (make it a fun color or odd shape) in their corner, add a small work table (or large chest that can double as more storage) with the seating, and they'll feel like they have their own living room altogether.

The entertainment center has those convenient doors that we like to close to hide the mess. It is time to open those doors and deal with the clutter that lurks behind them. Start by grabbing some twist-ties and gather up all the extra cords and wires spilling from your electronics. Tying them all together and hiding with cord covers is a good way to reduce the eye sore. Wipe down all the shelving and add small candles or another decorative items to make the space more inviting when the doors are open. For DVDs and music, be sure to buy a storage rack to keep them neatly stacked and easy to retrieve. Reserve drawers at the bottom for game system controls and other add-ons for your entertainment system you don't want to lose.

Whether you work from home or just have a computer room, chances are it is probably in need of organization. The best way to organize this small, yet significant space is by investing in actual office supplies.

Wireless is the way to go. Wireless keyboards, a wireless mouse and printer, and wireless routers are the best for eliminating all those cords that clutter the area. For the remaining essential wires, invest in cord covers and a place a plastic office mat under your desk and where your chair is going to roll around. Not only will it be easier to maneuver, but by placing the computer tower, paper shredder, and any other electrical equipment you have on the mat, you will reduce the risk of electrical fires and shock or power surge dangers.

Another thing that will keep you in tip-top organizational shape is a filing cabinet. Most are fireproof and come with locks, so you can keep important documents like passports and children's birth certificates in them. Insert filing folders into the drawers and color-code the sections so you know what goes where. For example, medical files may be in red and pay stubs and tax information may be coded in green.



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The attic is usually where all the stuff we never use goes. Why do we keep it? The best way to organize this spot is to get rid of anything up there that you haven't used for the past year. Old boxes, especially cardboard, attract insects such as termites and roaches, and can make your home an unpleasant place. Take everything out of those cardboard boxes and put it all in plastic bins instead. If the bins aren't clear, make sure you label each one, so you know what you're reaching for when it comes time to use a seasonal item.

If you have old furniture up there, such as a table or a dresser, you can make use of it, instead of letting it collect dust. Wipe the furniture clean and place miscellaneous items in the drawers or on the tabletop in bins by purpose and function, such as Christmas decorations, labeled accordingly. Those mystery boxes you had in your personal clothes closet belong up here, in the attic. If you're storing photos or other keepsakes, make sure they are in an airtight container and sealed to maintain preservation.

The garage is a multi-purpose space, holding everything from your cars to your lawn and garden tools. Garage shelving is one of the most important things to install in your home. Take time out to organize and group your items according to purpose, then place them on the shelves in a functional manner. For example, all of your hardware tools should be in one place (install a tool wall with hooks to save the most space), so you don't end up looking for the pesticide and actually finding a hammer.

Once you've started organizing your shelves, make sure the dangerous chemicals are up high and out of reach of pets and children, while the heavy and dangerous equipment is on the floor or close to the ground. You don't want a bottle of rat poison readily available for the dog to get into and you don't want a chainsaw on the top shelf in case it falls. Place vinyl coverings over your work surfaces so they're easier to wipe clean. Small items, such as screws and bottles of superglue can be stored in bins to save space. Sporting goods should have their own corner, complete with the installation of racks to hang bicycles and other equipment up and out of the way. With these organizational tools, your garage will be safer and feel bigger.

Mopping and dusting are important chores, but without organization, you're really only cleaning around the mess. By de-cluttering these rooms, you're not only saving space and increasing functionality, but you're cleaning your entire house without meaning to. If you've got a bunch of extra stuff to get rid of, consider having a yard sale and making some extra cash to put towards more storage bins and shelving units!

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


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The Only Barbecue Sauce You Need





INGREDIENTS

2 tablespoons onion powder

2 tablespoons garlic powder

Two 6-ounce cans tomato paste

2 tablespoons paprika

2/3 cup cider vinegar

2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce

1/4 cup packed dark brown sugar

2 tablespoons honey

2 tablespoons maple syrup

2 tablespoons kosher salt

2 tablespoons freshly ground black pepper

For Pork, Beef, and Anything Else You Pull off the Grill

I have heard people eating barbecue at festivals say that "the sauce makes the barbecue." It's not true. The smoke makes the barbecue. The sauce is a finisher. It's what you put on your meat after it cooks to enhance its appeal. It can add a great punch, but I've had plenty of delicious barbecued meat with no sauce at all. I've been around barbe cue sauces of different stripes all of my life. My family's sauce recipe, which my par ents were just beginning to market when my father suddenly passed away, is what got me into cooking competitive barbecue in the first place. We have always preferred a hickory-style sauce, meant to closely evoke and complement the flavor of hickory smoked meats. It's world famous and a secret recipe, so the only way you'll taste the original is to order it from me, but if you insist on not giving me your business, here's a reasonable approximation that is still damn delicious.

DIRECTIONS

Combine all of the ingredients in a blender and pulse a couple of times to thoroughly combine. Pour the mixture into a medium saucepan and place over medium heat. Stir continuously until the sauce is heated through, but do not allow it to come to a boil. Remove the pan from the heat. Use the sauce immediately as you like, or, if reserving for a later use, allow the mixture to cool, then pour it into a large bottle or container and store, tightly covered and refrigerated, for up to 1 year.



GRILLED AMERICAN LAMB CHOPS WITH MARINATED COLORADO POTATOES

6 servings

Recipe from Lachlan MacKinnon-Patterson, Frasca Food & Wine (Boulder, CO)

LAMB CHOPS

12 American Lamb loin chops 1/4 cup olive oil 2 cloves garlic, mashed 2 sprigs rosemary, chopped 1 lemon, juiced Coarsely ground black pepper

Rub lamb with olive oil, garlic, rosemary, lemon juice and black pepper. Cover with plastic wrap, refrigerate for 4 hours to marinate.

MARINATED COLORADO POTATOES

3/4 lb Colorado Russet potatoes
3/4 lb Colorado Purple Majesty potatoes
3/4 lb Colorado Yukon Gold potatoes
3/4 lb Colorado Mountain Rose potatoes
1 cup olive oil
2 cloves garlic, quartered

1 sprig rosemary, about 6 inches long 1 tsp chopped sage

1 tsp chopped parsley 2 tsps minced shallots

1/2 cup thinly sliced California dried mission figs

1 tsp sherry vinegar

Kosher salt and fresh ground pepper

Dice potatoes into 1/2 inch sized cubes, leaving skin on. In an 8 x 1-inch oblong baking dish, combine potatoes, oil, garlic and rosemary sprig; roast at 250°F for 2 hours or until potatoes are tender.

When potatoes are done, remove and discard the rosemary sprig and the garlic. Drain excess olive oil and discard. Gently combine sage, parsley, shallots, figs and sherry vinegar. For a more tangy flavor, add additional vinegar. Set aside.

Lightly salt and pepper the lamb chops to taste. Place on hot grill; cook 4 to 5 minutes per side or until desired degree of doneness.

Spoon approximately 3/4 cup marinated potatoes onto serving plate and arrange lamb chops on top. Garnish with fresh herbs.

NOTE: To maintain the brilliant colors of the potatoes after dicing, submerge in cold water until ready to cook.

Pulled Pork Burgers

Some people may call topping a burger with pulled pork gilding the lily, but who needs them? I call it taking your burger to the next level. Here's how.



4 TO 6 BURGERS

INGREDIENTS

11/2 pounds ground beef, preferably ground chuck with at least 20% fat, at room temperature 2 teaspoons Dijon mustard 1 tablespoon Only Rub Salt and freshly ground black pepper 4 to 6 hamburger buns, split 2 tablespoons unsalted butter, melted 12 ounces leftover pulled pork, reheated 4 to 6 tablespoons Only Sauce Lettuce, tomato, and any other toppings you like

DIRECTIONS

Heat a charcoal grill or gas grill to mediumhigh heat.

In a medium bowl, combine the beef with the mustard and rub, gently kneading into 4 to 6 equal patties, about 3/4 inch thick each. Season the burgers very generously with salt and pepper and transfer to a plate lined with plastic wrap.

Grill the burgers directly on the grill for about 10 minutes, turning once, for medium.

Move the burgers away from the heat to rest on a warm (but definitely not hot) part of the grill. Brush the cut sides of the buns with the melted butter and grill the cut sides of the buns for about 1 minute, until toasted.

Slide the burgers onto the buns and finish them by topping each with a small handful of pulled pork and Only Sauce, plus lettuce and tomato and whatever toppings you prefer. Serve immediately.



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

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The Only Barbecue Rub You Need



For Pork, Beef, and Anything Else You Want to Throw on the Grill

What does a rub do? Its job is to season the meat, help seal in moisture, and ensure you get great flavor on your smoked and grilled meats. Do you have to use it? No, of course not. You're the cook, and sometimes a steak is great with just salt and pepper, but it's a really easy thing to make ahead of time and keep around, and it makes your food taste exponentially better-so a rub is worth making and having in your bag of tricks. That said, if you're lazy, buy my own brand from me directly at jacksoldsouth.com. (Hey, don't you think I've forgotten for a second about my first love: making money!) Or you could try this recipe, which approximates (but never equals, mind you) my own secret formula.

INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup packed light brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons chili powder
- 2 tablespoons mustard powder
- 2 tablespoons onion powder
- 2 tablespoons garlic powder
- 2 teaspoons cayenne pepper
- 2 tablespoons kosher salt
- 2 tablespoons freshly ground black pepper



DIRECTIONS

In a large bowl, combine all the ingredients. Stir thoroughly to combine. You can store this rub in an airtight container for up to 1 year.





Perfect Apple-Glazed Barbecue Pork Chops

Think of this dish as the smoked version of pork chops and applesauce, that classic oven-roasted dish that we're fixing to make a whole lot better by cooking it over an open fire and turning the sauce into a finger-licking glaze.



INGREDIENTS

1 quart plus 1/4 cup apple juice

2 tablespoons light brown sugar

2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil

4 teaspoons Only Rub (page 22)

8 bone-in pork chops, about 1inch thick (10 to

12 ounces each)

1 cup ketchup

6 garlic cloves, thinly sliced

1/4 cup red wine vinegar

Salt

DIRECTIONS

In each of 2 large resealable plastic bags, combine 2 tablespoons of the apple juice, 1 tablespoon of the brown sugar, 1 tablespoon of the olive oil, and 2 teaspoons of the rub. Seal the bags and shake to mix. Place 4 pork chops in each bag, seal, and shake again to coat the chops. Refrigerate for at least 4 hours or overnight.


Make the glaze: In a large saucepan, combine the remaining 1 quart apple juice with the ketchup, garlic, and vinegar and bring to a boil over high heat, stirring once or twice. Reduce the heat to medium and simmer, stirring occasionally, until reduced to 2 cups, about 30 minutes. Season with salt.

Heat a charcoal grill (see page 4) or gas grill (see page 5) to high heat.

Remove the pork chops from the marinade, discard the marinade, and season the chops with salt. Grill uncovered until nicely charred and just pink in the center, about 12 minutes per side. Brush a thick layer of the glaze on each chop, cover the grill, and cook until the pork is nicely bronzed, about 3 minutes. Remove from the grill, loosely cover with foil, and rest for 10 minutes before serving.

Make it in the oven: Marinate the pork chops and make the glaze as directed above. When ready to cook the pork chops, preheat the oven to 400°F. Remove the chops from the marinade, discard the marinade, and heat 2 tablespoons olive oil in a large ovenproof skillet over medium-high heat. Working in batches, cook the chops until browned, 3 to 5 minutes per side, transferring them to a plate when done. Arrange the chops in 1large or 2 small roasting pans, brush a thick layer of the glaze on each chop, cover loosely with foil, and cook in the oven until the pork is cooked through, 8 to 11 minutes. Remove the pan from the oven and rest for 10 minutes before uncovering and serving.


GROWING VEGETABLES

EDGE THE GRASS

Use wooden edgings, such as wicker or log-style, to bring the look of spring to your lawn. There are also pretty wrought-iron or stone options that come in many colors, as well. Edgings will retain moisture and hold soil back, creating a structured, even space for your grass to flourish. They not only give a primped look to your lawn, but they keep it healthier as well by holding all the nutrients in. For added elegance, line gravel at the border just before your edgings to create symmetry around the entire lawn. Not only will the gravel







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gravel look nice, but it will act as a drainage system, funneling out any excess or unwanted moisture from the grass. Working together with the edgings, this approach will ensure that your lawn is the healthiest and best-looking.

PLANT MORE TREES

Spring is the best season for planting trees and shrubs, so if your landscape is looking a little bare, now is the time. For smaller properties, go with crabapples and dogwoods. They blossom in bright, eye-catching colors and rarely grow over 20 feet. They are low maintenance trees and won't produce much leaves for raking. For larger properties, consider maples or magnolia trees. The magnolias will offer large white flowers with an incredible smell for added charm. Maples have beautiful leaves that change colors like a chameleon and the large clusters will provide visual splendor. Foliage in general, but especially trees, add significant value to properties. They also offer food if you opt to plant a fruit-bearing variety. However, do not edge your trees like you did with your grass, especially just after planting. New tree roots need to poke out of the soil and have a chance to wrap themselves into the ground for a solid foundation. Old tree roots will have already formed above the ground, making it difficult to place edgings symmetrically. A bit of mulch spread neatly over the top will look just as nice, and will be healthiest for your new tree as well.

PLANT SEASONAL FLOWERS IN BRIGHT COLORS


Springtime is ideal for planting species that are already in bloom. Pansies, daffodils, geraniums, lilies, and tulips are popular spring choices, as they come in many colors and don't mind cooler weather that may be sticking around until summer. If you want to plant these flowers as bulbs, you'll have to wait until fall and next spring they'll pop and blossom with ease and barely any maintenance. These types of flowers don't grow very tall, so installing window boxes to cover high-siding on a house is an option. Otherwise, enjoy them all season long in their pots. To add

height from the ground up, consider stacking paving stones to bring the flowers to eye-level. You can mix and match flower types and colors, but you'll want to give them 6-8 inches of space in between each other to grow.

SPREAD MULCH OVER YOUR PLANTS

Spreading mulch over the planting surface and lacing the beds to create an even border will not only offer a put-together look, but it will discourage weeds and other unwanted plants from sprouting up. While mulch is the more traditional option, pea pebbles and other small gravel work well as alternatives to mulch if you're looking for a softer, more modern feel. You can align large gravel within the pebbles in different shapes and patterns if you're feeling artistic or creative. Any and all gravel is good for drainage and moisture retention, so having it around is not only pleasing to the eye, but pleasing to the plants as well.





Dress Up Your House

BRING THE SPRING-CLEANING OUTSIDE

Wash your house. You can do it yourself by renting or buying equipment, or hire a team, but washing the outside of your home will add instant value if vou're trying to sell, and will boost your curb appeal significantly overall. Warm water and diluted dish detergent will be gentle enough for your paint, but harsh enough to wash away all the grease and dirt. Consider invested in new gutters, such as copper ones that will add shine and glamour to your home's appearance.  of the house inviting and comfortable.



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



Trainability Level: Hard

Most stubborn when learning: to be social & less aggressive

Cats are crepuscular animals, meaning they are most active at dawn and dusk hours. Cats are also natural-born predators with an instinct to hunt. While these character traits are intriguing, they are not always convenient for owners. If you have a ferocious feline that you're looking to domesticate to be more social and less aggressive, try these training techniques:

When your cat becomes aggressive. don't run around screaming at him, and don't walk away either. Doing these things will tell the cat that he wins, and by displaying aggression he will get what he wants. Instead, whenever your cat begins to scratch, bite, hiss, or show any other signs of aggression, remain calm and show no change in your own behavior.

When he begins to play or calm down, present him with a treat. Repeating this process will take patience, and the cat may run off the first few times, but after several tries, he will begin to understand that positive behavior will get him what he wants.

Familiar with the "bite and run" scheme? This is where your kitty seems to be happily purring in your lap, then all of a sudden he turns, bites your hand (or scratches) and runs off. This happens because the cat's natural predatory instinct kicks in. To avoid the "bite and run" episodes, simply reduce the amount of cuddling time. Allow your cat to sit on your lap for a moment, show him affection. and then place him on the floor

(try petting him with your foot instead). You'll be surprised by how much more affection he'll start demanding once he's not being chased for it.



Trainability Level: Hard

Most stubborn when learning: not to scream or screech

Birds are highly intelligent animals and we've seen proof of this when staring in awe at a bird who has just squawked out a few words of the English language. Birds are natural performers, so they are going to be divas. They need constant attention and when they don't get it, they often scream and cry, just like us. If you have a bird that's being a bit of a drama queen, try these exercises to help minimize the shrieking that you (and your neighbors!) put up with.

Don't yell at your bird. Most birds scream throughout the day at time changes and screaming back at them will not scare them into

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hushing up. Instead it will excite them even more. Instead of yelling, try cooing at your bird by making subtle movements with your head and lips, and slowly stroke the bird on his breast. These are relaxation cues which will show him that silence is rewarded and screaming is not. If the shrieking persists, ignore him and walk away. When he guiets down, come back with a treat.

Another method: put his cage cover back on as punishment. The bird will be forced to sit in the dark and he will quiet down. When he does, give him a treat. Also, make sure your bird has plenty of toys and puzzles to work on, otherwise the screaming will result from boredom. Remember, screaming is natural for birds, so you won't completely eliminate the noise, but if they don't calm down with these methods, consider a visit to the vet. Screaming is also initiated by pain and/or stress.

Ferrets

Trainability Level: Medium

Most stubborn when learning: not to bite

Just for clarification, ferrets do not bite because they are mean little boogers with no conscience. They bite because that is their main form of interaction. A ferret's skin has an extra layer just under the coat that is thicker and less-penetrable, so when ferrets bite, it doesn't hurt them like it hurts us! They're socializing in their natural way.

However, biting does hurt and, especially if there are children in the home, teaching your ferret not to bite is the most important tech-

HOUSE PET nique for him to master. If you've exactly how he's misbehaved. Re-

got a kit, training should take between 2-4 weeks until they learn "no bite!" If you've got an adult that has never been properly trained, you're looking at a longer time frame, and some serious bite wounds in the process.

Training your

Training methods for biting are the same, no matter the age, but hand-on-fur contact is the key. Begin by scruffing (grabbing your ferret by the loose patch of skin on the back of their neck). Scruff your ferret when he bites and drag him a few inches to show that you're the boss. While doing this, sternly say, "No bite!" Your ferret will know he is being punished and as long as you're punishing him immediately after biting, he'll know

ward your ferret when he plays or cuddles without biting.

Try apple bitter sprays (other deterring solutions available) as another "no bite" method. Spray the solution directly on your fingers and on things you don't

want the ferret to chew, but never spray it on their face. Most ferrets despise apple bitter and will not put their mouth anywhere near it.

Lizards

Trainability Level: Easy

Most stubborn when learning: to be handled & held

Lizards, like the friendly bearded dragon, make for exciting and exotic alternatives to the "normal" house pet. Bearded dragons are easy to take care of and eat a fresh diet of crickets, worms, and salads/leafy greens. They can be potty trained and even walked outside on a leash. Nevertheless, all of these amazing relationship perks come after the hardest and most basic technique to "get a handle" on: holding your lizard. First, familiarize the lizard with your hands by simply leaving your hand in the cage. Slowly stroke your lizard with one finger. After a while, move into picking him up. Pick him up a few inches off of the floor of his cage, hold him for 15-30 seconds, and then set him down. Do not remove the lizard from the cage until you have practiced this and gotten him comfortable with the idea of being picked up.

Make sure the habitat is in a place that gets a good amount of traffic so he gets used to noise and movements, and never grab a lizard unless they're aware

of your presence. Startling a lizard and having it jump and run under your fridge won't be fun for anyone.

Do not release or put down a squirming lizard. Keep a firm handle on them until they relax, then set them down. This will teach them that wiggling and writhing will not get them what they want.

No matter what kind of pet you invite into your home, you and the animal should both be able to live together harmoniously. If your pet is giving you trouble, be sure to check for any and all signs of bad health or illnesses before you begin training exercises. You want to make sure that your pet is only misbehaving, and not trying to tell you they're in pain. When in doubt about the animal you hoped to bond with, check for local obedience schools (sanctuaries for more exotic pets) that will help teach you both one on one how to coexist with each other. And remember, "They're more afraid of you than you are of them," is true in every sense.





10 Home Improvement Tools You DIDN'T KNOW YOU NEEDED

Improving your home is hard work and takes a lot of time and effort to complete. Whether you're a die-hard DIYer or just starting out in the world of home improvement projects, every homeowner should have the necessary tools it takes to get the job done right. Sure, hammers and screwdrivers are a given, and should be part of your basic toolkit, but if you're installing new flooring or trying to tile your shower, that box of basics won't even get you halfway through the project. Take into consideration these essentials that we've compiled for getting any project done in an efficient and timely fashion.

Compound Miter Saw This is what you use to get those pretty cuts on your crown molding. Cutting frames and molding is tricky to begin with, and you don't want to cut an expensive piece of trim at the wrong angle and have to scrap it. Miter saws work to get a precise cut and are usually small and portable. They can be used to cut wood for a variety of projects but they are the best tool for moldings because you can drop the wheel to angle your cuts both horizontally and vertically.

Tool Box Essentials

Finishing Nail Gun

Finishing nail guns are best for trim and moldings, and any other permanent nailing you may want to do around the house. Nail guns are better for projects that require overall accuracy, because of their speed and precision. With a pull of the trigger, you can nail 50 feet of molding down in less than 10 minutes. That same project would take you an hour with a hammer.

Reciprocating Saw, or "Sawzall"

The Sawzall is a small, handheld saw that uses a powerful "back and forth" motion with a single heavy duty blade. There are interchangeable blades ranging from metal cutting to drywall. Use this saw to cut out a rotted piece of molding or to demo a door frame without having to smash the entire structure to pieces.

Putty Knives

These tools come in a variety of widths and can sometimes be purchased in packs, ranging from small detail knives to large surface knives. Putty knives are used to scrape excess material off of a finished surface. They are great for backsplashes and other tile work because the flexible blade gives you enough wiggle room to remove clumps easily and ensure a smooth, even surface all over. By applying pressure with your finger to run through grout grooves, you can sometimes take off too much or too little, and your lines won't look even. With the putty knife, you bypass that issue, and with a little warm water and a rag, the material will wipe right off of your tile once you've scraped it. Putty knives can also be used for many other projects, such as removing old caulking and other clumps of dried paint from your walls, as well as roof patching with hot tar, and even designing a custom wall pattern by scraping grooves into wet stucco.

Wet Saw or Manual Tile Cutter

If you're tiling a big area and you need to trim a lot down or cut around odd angles, you'll want a wet saw. They release water over the tile as they cut to prevent breakage. If you're not sure about whether to buy one for a single project, stores will allow you to rent a wet saw. However, if you're a hardcore DIYer, investing in a wet saw isn't a bad idea. Manual tile cutters work just as well, but are harder to get angles and round cuts out of. When purchasing a manual tile cutter, be sure to buy one that is capable of making angled cuts and is wider than the tile you're cutting by at least two inches.



Paint Sprayers

Paint sprayers can save you so much time and energy, especially when painting big surface areas, such as the exterior of your home or staining a large deck. These are multi-purpose tools and usually come in interior and exterior versions. The main difference is the exterior models have more power packed in them for a greater spraying distance and some come with extension handles for doing multi-story homes. The sprayers do not use a lot of paint so you'll have to spray three or four coats on, but this will take you less time than hand-rolling or painting just two coats.



Tool Box Essentials





Masks, like hinge and outlet masks, are handy little stickers that you can put around your outlets, switch covers or hinges to eliminate the need of removing all your hardware before painting. Painters' tape can get sticky and messy when placed over hardware, especially if you're trying to bend it around tough angles. Stick to the tape for straight edges and patterns, and if you're really looking for perfection, try an edge-painter. They exist, specifically for painting edges along framing and around windows or molding. You simply dip them in your can of paint and go!



Floor Cutters

These particular tools are worth buying because they can cut all sorts of flooring with ease. Hardwood, thick laminate, vinyl, linoleum, and corkboard flooring can all be handled by a floor cutter to reach odd angles and cut precise measurements. By using a simple utility knife for your flooring projects, you may mess up and make an uneven cut, so investing in a floor cutter that is designed to minimize those annoyances would be beneficial to any DIYer. In a way it works like a giant paper cutter, giving you an even line every time.



Track Cleaners

Do you have windows? The answer should be yes. Do you hate cleaning them? Assuming that's a "yes" as well, consider track cleaners to make the job much easier than fighting with a vacuum and a broom. These cleaners come in various forms, such as air sprays that remove dirt (like the ones for cleaning computer keyboards), lubricants - WD-40 and garage door spray - and kits that come with scrubbers and small brushes for reaching into corners. Track cleaners. no matter the kind, are essential when installing new sliding glass or French doors because they provide you with a clean surface. For windows, track cleaners help with lubricating the tracks themselves to make sure opening and closing is safe and easy, as well as regular cleaning.



Squeegees

When cleaning your windows, especially large exterior panels, it is hard to remove all the dirt and streaks. We are often just spreading the dirt around and the harsh rubbing causes static, which will attract dirt and dust even more. To make windows shine like new, simply use a window cleaner or a teaspoon of dish detergent in water and a squeegee to get the job done like a professional. Most window squeegees come with an extension handle to reach high spots and several scrubbers and blades to choose from. The interior panels can simply be wiped down, but for exterior panels, squeegees are a must. If you're putting your house on the market, squeegee the windows before a showing to boost curb appeal and give your house a "brand new" feel.





First, make sure your vard is well lit. 

1. Create a personal sanctuary.
